SECTION A

Item 1

Read the following text and respond to the task that follows.

Did you know that cigarette smoking can make men impotent and therefore make them fail to fulfill their conjugal obligations in marriage, and make women unable to conceive or give birth to premature, underweight or stillborn babies?

Dr. Victoria Mukasa, a public health specialist, says that cigarette smoking, besides causing cancers and heart diseases, also brings about impotence and barrenness to men and women respectively. She says the cigarette smoke contains more than 4000 chemicals and approximately 60 carcinogens (cancer causing agents). These include nicotine which she says is responsible for constricting and narrowing down blood vessels in the human body hence causing inadequate supply of blood to various parts of the body including reproductive organs.

‘For example,’ she says, ‘erection needs sufficient supply of blood to the man’s reproductive organ (penis), so the inadequate supply of blood could affect the ability to erect and eventually lead to impotence.’

Besides, she adds that cigarette smoking also damages the sperms and when a wife of a smoker conceives, the likelihood of the foetus being abnormal is high. Dr. Mukasa says effects on women are worse as they find it difficult to conceive and if one conceives, the likelihood of miscarrying is higher as compared to nonsmokers.

She explains that women smokers normally give birth to low weight babies of 2.5 kilograms and that such babies may not survive as compared to those born at the standard weight of three to four kilograms. ‘Nicotine constricts blood vessels and hence inadequate blood reaches the placenta, meaning that there are less blood nutrients to the fetus hence inadequate growth or death,’ she explains.

According to Mukasa, these health risks could also be passed onto passive smokers through exposure to cigarette smoke.

‘The chances of contracting smoke-related diseases are still there. People react differently to the same exposure. While one person may get infected out of the same exposure, another may not,’ she explains.

In addition to impotence and infertility, Dr. Mukasa reveals that of all the cancers reported in hospitals, majority are related to cigarette smoking or tobacco chewing. These include cancers of the nose, tongue, lungs, throat, stomach, pancreas, big colon, rectum, anus, kidney and bladder as the most common cases in men. In women, uterine, breast and cervical cancers are commonplace.

Dr. Sylvester Onzivua, an anatomical and forensic pathologist at Mulago referral hospital says that there is a progressive increase in the number of people diagnosed with cancers at the hospital. However, he cautions that there was no scientific research conducted to establish whether this has any connection with cigarette smoking, though he admits that in other countries, this, to a larger extent, is linked to smoking.

‘We don’t have concrete scientific data to link the increasing cases of cancer to cigarette smoking. Basically, we have not been targeting that data. But cancers of the mouth, tongue, lips, lungs and esophagus are on the increase,’ he says, adding that, ‘these have been scientifically proven elsewhere in the world to be related to cigarette smoking.’

He also says that respiratory diseases, which are also related to cigarette smoking, follow malaria among diseases affecting people in the country. Dr. Mukasa says that cigarette smoke causes heart diseases, narrows blood vessels especially in the heart thus causing inadequate flow of blood to other organs of the body.

It also causes gradual loss of hair and solidification of eye lenses (cataracts) which eventually leads to blindness. She explains that all these diseases are common among active smokers though, with constant exposure, even passive smokers can get them.
